

Appendix

The appendix contains a bibliography of all the entries in the Stationers' Company Register from 1557 to 1640 that cannot be traced to an existing copy. Each bibliographical entry contains the following information: the name of the Stationer, the title, the date of entry and the Arber reference (*A Transcript of the Registers of the Company of Stationers of London, 1554-1640*, ed. Edward Arber, Vols. I-IV). For example, Ar. I. 74 refers to Arber volume I, p.74. The bibliography is listed by date of entry and in the order in which they were entered on that day.

The entries have been simplified for ease of use. Author name, translator and language have been included where they are mentioned in the Register. Other information such as the entry fee, the name of the examiner and the type of entry e.g. ballad or playbook has been excluded, unless specified in the title. Roman numerals are used when a single entry references a number of works e.g. [I] ij bookes of master CALVYNS, [II] ij bookes of master CALVYNS. All spellings and suggested corrections appear as originally transcribed by Edward Arber, except where I have standardised the names of the stationers and the letters 'i' to 'j' and 'v' to 'u'. Entries where the stationers' first name is unclear contain [Master].
